## Strategic Plan Outlines Goals for 2011

The Strategic Plan, finalized on October 31 of this year, outlines a plan of action for the church for the next five years. The plan's goals for 2011 are listed here.

### STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

**THE STRATEGIC PLAN OF THE UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST CHURCH OF ELGIN IS CREATED TO SET FORTH GOALS FOR THE CHURCH FOR THE NEXT FIVE YEARS. THESE GOALS FLOW FROM THE ENDS POLICIES, WHICH WERE CREATED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES. THESE ENDS POLICIES WERE DEVELOPED FROM THE VISION AND MISSION STATEMENT.**

#### 1. Community

Goal: Within their first year of membership each member will be involved in at least two non-worship service events

Rationale: Connects new members to the community, which is essential to member retention and growth.

Goal: Develop three new/improved ways to inform the larger community about the UUCE every two years.

Rationale: Raises our visibility and lets people interested in liberal religion know that we exist.

Goal: Make the congregation aware of the conflict resolution policy each fall.

Rationale: Allows members to try to resolve intra-church conflict, which deepens their experience and allows them to stay involved.

#### 2. Freedom of Belief and Spiritual Inquiry

Goal: At least 75% of UUCE members, bound by the values expressed in our Seven UU Principles, believe that UUCE provides a safe spiritual community in which a religious belief is never the object of ridicule, but rather, of exploration and discovery.

Rationale: Allows more people to feel comfortable joining UUCE and continuing their memberships. Identifies UUCE by what we stand for, not by what we condemn.


Goal: Existing worship services, programs and events that embrace religious and spiritual diversity are identified and evaluated. In addition, at least two new opportunities of this kind are added each year.

Rationale: Enables us to go beyond tolerance and identify ways our diverse beliefs and practices are expressions of UU principles thereby connecting us all to one another.

#### 3. Life Long Learning

Goal: Present and distribute to the congregation a list of available programs, groups and activities three times per year. Include information about how to start new programs.

Rationale: Increases involvement by raising awareness of opportunities for involvement.

- Budget report (questions on two line items, approval postponed until further information received)
- Earmarked Funds, Executive Team, Monitoring Reports approved by consensus
- Unfinished Business:
  - a. Strategic Plan Kickoff—Strategic Plan item #5 added to the Ends Policy. Strategic Plan will be made available to the membership electronically, and printed copies can be requested.
  - b. Security Policy Changes Follow up – Beth to follow up with Executive Team to clarify what

updates have been made regarding building security.

- New Business:
  - a. Board Covenant—approved by consensus with minor corrections for grammar.
  - b. Work Calendar—Kevin Sweeney will check into information on external audit and Endowment Committee updates. Calendar to be updated by adding review of Governance Process I to January tasks, and will make minor additions to March task list for clarity.
  - c. Review Service Calendar—no changes
  - d. Review 2010 Board Retreat Goals—general discussion
  - e. Convene Task Force on staff compensation—Steve Stultz and Betsy Thrasher will be our task force.

## Strategic Plan Goals for 2011, continued

Goal: Present five new lay-led programs per year.

Rationale: Increases diversity of offerings, attracts new members, and helps develop new leaders.

### 4. Social Justice

Goal: Partner with at least 2 other organizations, one of which must be new to UUCE, on a sustainability project.

Rationale: Strengthens UUCE's ability to positively impact environmental sustainability.

Goal: Maintain Green Sanctuary certification, and apply for re-certification every three years.

Rationale: Supports our commitment to the 7th Principle - the Interdependent Web of Existence of which we are a part.

Goal: Encourage youth (ages Pre-K through 8th grade) involvement in Social Justice programs and activities by having each age group participate in at least two Social Justice projects during the church year.

Rationale: Engages our young people in Service Learning, which promotes a sense of social responsibility consistent with the UU faith,

and in turn helps to meet real community needs.

### 5. Stewardship

Goal: Resurface the Labyrinth with a durable material which is environmentally friendly and provides weed control.

Rationale: Maintains and enhances an attractive and usable asset.

Goal: Discuss and identify leaders and potential leaders in the congregation.

Rationale: Allows us to be better able to fill Board and Committee Chair positions as necessary.

Goal: Annually, hold a leadership retreat off-site in a neutral space.

Rationale: Allows church leadership a chance to form better bonds to foster communication; allows all attendees to participate without the draw of "business as usual."

Goal: Compile and maintain a "UUsers Guide" handbook which gives necessary information about how to get things done in our church, as well as policies and by-laws.

Rationale: Allows all church members to understand and navigate the church.

They have no need for cereal at this time.



Afternoon Book Group will meet at 12:30 on Monday, December 27, at the home of Alice Macy to discuss *The Ha-Ha* by Dave King.



The Social Justice Council is gearing up to participate in the commenting and voting phase of the Unitarian Universalist Association's 4-year Congregational Study/Action Issue on Ethical Eating:

Food and Environmental Justice. The UUA's Committee on Social Witness has put together a draft **Statement of Conscience**. The purpose of the commenting and voting phase is for congregations to have the opportunity to amend or affirm this draft, in order to place it on the agenda for the 2011 General Assembly. As part of this process, we are looking at conducting a number of events, including a possible Religious Exploration and Education class on Food Justice, and/or hosting a dinner/movie night. The deadline for voting on



the Statement of Conscience is soon—**February 1, 2011**, and so notices on these events will happen rapidly as well. Please watch the weekly church announcements and e-lists for more information as it becomes available, and read the **Statement of Conscience** on the UUA website.
