Beyond Categorical Thinking

"Will the new minister hear me? Will my concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our minister?"

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender, gender identity, nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) comes to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times, as we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture," we can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister.

On the weekend of *October 5*, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Elgin (UUCE) will participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The UUCE Search Committee invites all congregational leaders, members, and friends to participate in this workshop.



The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a Sunday morning service led by a BCT workshop facilitator followed by a three-hour workshop. In the workshop, UUCE members will:

- Consider the hopes, expectations, and concerns they have for a new minister.
- Learn more about the ministerial search process, and
- Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate.

Come on October 5 at 1 p.m. at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Elgin to participate in this UUA-sponsored workshop, led by Michael Takada and Dan Hislip. Lunch will be provided between the service and the workshop.

The selection of a minister is important. The Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop is another opportunity for everyone in our congregation to be a part of that process. This experience will provide guidance for the Search Committee in our work. We look forward to seeing you there!

Lise's Letter



One of the things I love about being in a religious or spiritual community is the paradoxes involved. We all aspire to care for one another and to help make

the world a better place, but we also work towards these goals in many different ways. Part of the reason we work towards these ends in a variety of ways is because we have largely or slightly different visions of how this could look. On our way to these visions we express ourselves through our diverse theologies or philosophies; we also use a variety of talents to get us there. Some of us work through the arts (the Aesthetics or Worship Committee, Musicians), some are administrators (the Board, Finance and Endowment Committees, the Executive Team), some like to work with their hands (Building and Grounds), and some are relational (the Care Team, Religious Education and Exploration).

Of course people usually have a mix of attributes, but we don't always recognize their complexity because we're blinded by some of their more dominant habits. This broad diversity can be challenging, but it also enriches us as well, especially when we take the time to talk about and understand our differences. Have you ever worked on a committee or project and found yourself initially knocking heads with someone for whom you later developed a great appreciation and affection? I think we all know this is possible, but it often takes more energy, attention, and courage

than we'd like to devote. But when we take the time to reach those understandings, we often learn the most, not only about the person with whom we're conversing but about ourselves as well. I can speak from experience when I say that sometimes those self-discoveries are not always the most flattering, but when reflected upon they often bring the most profound learnings and opportunity for change.

This month I'm participating in a pulpit exchange with the UU minister from Rockford and I'm planning to do at least one or two other exchanges with other ministers this year. It gives us as ministers a chance to learn how other congregations do things, and the congregations we serve the opportunity to experience different perspectives and styles in the pulpit. UUCE will also have a guest speaker from the UUA this month to help the congregation consider different options for its future settled minister. Just like members of a congregation, no two ministers are alike either and they also have a variety of gifts and strengths that aren't always apparent the first time you meet them. I hope you enjoy this chance to experiment with and reflect on your pulpit preferences and how they can complement the rest of the ministry that happens at UUCE.

President's Reflections



To say that the past year has been a busy one for the Board would be an understatement and news to no one. And so, as we looked over our coming year at the annual BoT retreat and at a special meeting soon after, we prioritized the

work ahead. We hope to address that which is most urgent, without forgetting the other important tasks before us as a Board and as a congregation.

One thing that needs doing periodically is the review of Vision and Mission statements. Connected to this is the review of our Covenant, a statement of how we will relate to and behave with each other. The Board actually did begin this work last spring, determining that it would be best to begin with our Covenant. The reason is, as we have been going though this time of discussion regarding every aspect of our life together, there have been strong differences at times, resulting in some pretty heated encounters with hurt or angry feelings. Of course we know how to behave with each other, respectfully, lovingly, encouragingly. But somehow, in the heat of a moment when we are considering something very important to us, we forget this all too easily, saying and doing things that are harmful and counterproductive.

What Board members learned when we tried to open the conversation about a church-wide review of our covenant was that people did not have the energy or time to take on another discussion, especially in the summer. The Settled Minister Search Committee was just getting started, and their work also requires much active participation by everyone in the congregation. If the Board is to support the SMSC in their work, we need and want to do that, rather than compete for the finite amount

of energy each of us has as a church member or friend.

So the Board determined that the better course is to shelve the Covenant review temporarily. The Task Force in charge of this effort has kept the information we gathered from the meetings that were held, including a children's REE session when the children were given an opportunity to add their thoughts to how we want to behave together.

We will hold this information and wait until we have our settled minister. Then we will take it up again, along with review of our Vision and Mission. In the meantime, we can remember:

- 1. Speak kindly, respectfully, and carefully with each other, listening at least as much as we talk.
- 2. When we have differences of opinion or approach, honor the differences, remembering there is more than one "right" (effective) way to do things.
- 3. Make every attempt to work through disagreements by going directly to the person with whom we disagree, not a third party to complain and gossip.
- 4. If we are unable to resolve a difference one on one, invite a third person to be present and assist in the conversation, looking for points of agreement and what is right, not who is right.
- 5. Remember, we are all, in the end, wanting to be the best congregation we can possibly be.

The Pantry needs pork and beans, boxed dinners with meat and vegetables,


boxes of mashed potatoes, toilet paper, bar soap, and of course, peanut butter, jelly, and cereal.
