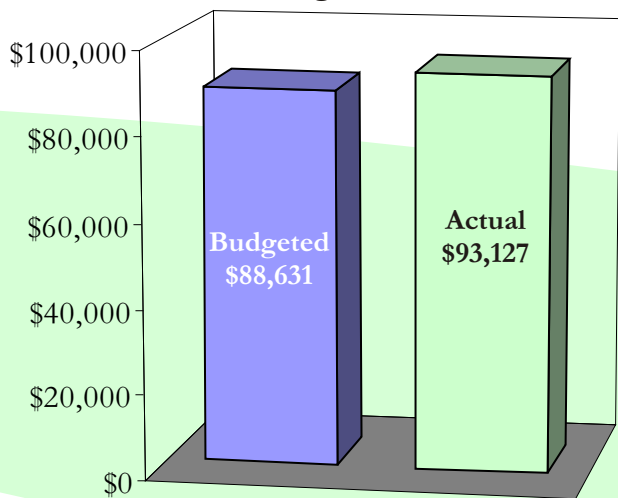

## TENDING OUR COMMUNITY

In March, 2002, I began working at UUCE as Growth Coordinator. My charge was simple but challenging—I was asked to help our church grow into a mid-sized church (150+ members) in three years. The job was divided into two parts—internal growth efforts and external growth efforts. Kathy Hislip worked on the external public relations effort. I continued with the internal work of putting structures in place to help support the growth that occurred. This month marks the end of my work as Growth Coordinator. I wanted to use this space to tell you a little about the results of our growth efforts over the past three years.

First, we have grown in visibility. As a result of Kathy's efforts, neighborhoods throughout our area received special invitations to visit our church and others have heard about us through NPR and local newspapers. The Prairie Fest brought people to our church to learn more about our environmental commitments, and thanks to the work of Todd Underwood, a record number of visitors heard about us via our beautifully re-designed web site.

We have grown in community. When we ask people about their experience as visitors at UUCE, they often mention the welcoming community they find here. They talk about our beautiful building and our wonderful worship services. People who decide to return also mention the chances they have had to get involved. These chances have increased over the past two years as we have added programs to meet the interests and needs of our growing membership. We continue to expand our community outreach through social action programs.

And yes, we have grown in numbers. Three years ago our membership was 120; now we have over 150 members and over 20 friends who attend and participate on a regular basis. This growth has caused us to move toward a new governance model for the Board and Staff as they guide our growing church. It has also resulted in intensive planning to better accommodate our increased membership.

The most amazing thing for me over the past three years has been the enthusiasm and cooperative spirit I have seen in our congregation. There is a willingness to open our doors to prospective UUs, and to make the kind of changes that are necessary to ensure they can become a part of the UUCE community. Thanks to all who have helped out along the way. Special thanks to Dan Brosier, Kathy Underwood, the Hislips, Alice Macy, Todd Underwood, Kim Cecil, Cheren Waller, Mila Brinker, Jim Porter, Lydia Larrabee, the Welcoming Team, and all the Board members and committee chairs. It has been great working with you all and I look forward to continuing into the future as Church Administrator.

### CONGREGATIONAL DECISION-MAKING

Our congregation faces a complicated issue at this time. Andrew Voross, a former participant in the life of this church, has requested to return to our congregation since he has been released from four years in prison for criminal sexual abuse of a child under 13 years of age. In order to make a decision as a congregation, we began with a service about sexual abuse that focused on its effects on victims. We have two additional services planned to consider the issues around *Sex Offenders (March 20)* and the implications of having a *Sex Offender Within The Church Community (April 10)*. After these services, we also plan to have a discussion group that will allow members and friends of UUCE to talk about their concerns and questions about the possibility of including Andrew again in our community (in April, date and time TBA).

Finally, we will vote on the issue in May at the Annual Meeting. Our plan is to have that vote be unanimous—meaning that Andrew would be allowed to return **only** if everyone agrees that we can handle the responsibility and support needed to make it a safe space for all.

Understandably, many people might have the immediate reaction that allowing an offender to return to the congregation is not a good idea. If you have any concerns, we implore you to read the restrictions to which Andrew must agree (see list below), and we also implore you to attend the remaining two sessions about sex offenders. I understand that many of the concerns are of a personal and parental nature, but our community deserves to have everyone’s concerns voiced and respected as we consider this decision.

The following is a list of the restrictions that would be placed on Andrew if he were to return:

1. **Compliance with parole and sex offender registration.**
2. **Compliance for at least six months with sex offender treatment .**
3. **Signed information release** between therapist in sex offender program and minister or other official person at UUCE.
4. **Approval of sex offender treatment program** that Andrew is ready to return to this setting.
5. **Continuous chaperone** by an informed adult during all times on the property at UUCE.
6. **Avoidance of all children at all times** when on the property; if children approach, Andrew is to quickly but respectfully extricate himself from the interaction.
7. **Attendance restricted** to adult events/activities and Sunday Services.
8. Assigning a **general seating area for Andrew** and his chaperone in services so that children and others can be asked to avoid that area as “not a place for children.”

Andrew has been very receptive to all of the restrictions that would be imposed and understands that this privilege would be terminated immediately if he were to break any of the rules.

Please take the time to consider this information carefully. I fully believe that Andrew is far less a danger to us than the offender who is not known. I could not personally support this idea if it would place children or others in harm’s way. Please contact me or a member of the Board of Trustees if you have any questions.

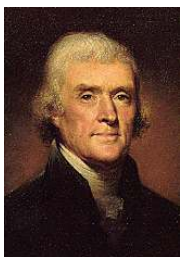

## SECOND SERVICE TASK FORCE BEGINS WORK

The Board of Trustees has appointed seven people to form the Second Service Task Force (SSTF). We are Andrea Schmidlin (chair), Steve Askins, Dan Brosier, Carl Deitrick, Alice Macy, Kathy Underwood, and Elise Wall. Linda Porter serves as an ex officio member of the SSTF.

The Space Utilization Task Force recommended that a second service feasibility study be done. Our charge from the Board is to study the feasibility of adding a second service to the Sunday morning offerings at UUCE. This does not imply that other options have been eliminated or that any decisions have been made. The specific activities the task force will pursue include, but aren't limited to:

- Review of research on adding worship services,
- Visits and interviews with other churches which have added services,
- Interviews with impacted committees, staff, and individuals within our church,
- Surveys of the congregation, and
- Drawing up a recommended implementation plan to submit to the Board

We have already begun work on the first two items listed above. We plan to spend about a year completing our work, and everyone will be given multiple opportunities to provide input to the SSTF. We promise to listen thoughtfully to everyone who would be impacted by the addition of a second service. If you have previous experience in a congregation where an additional service was added, we would like to speak with you early in our work, and we would ask that you contact one of the SSTF members.

At the canvass training session I made the comment that this church provided me with entertainment, as well as being my religious community and my spiritual journey center. I made the statement in the context of moving money in the Hislip budget from entertainment to church giving to be able to up our pledge somewhat, but since then I've been pondering the real meaning behind "this church provides me with entertainment." I'm not sure I've figured it out completely, but I've made some progress.

Entertainment, as defined in the Kathy Hislip dictionary of life, translates into visiting, as in telling one another our stories as we swing on the front porch sipping lemonade with nowhere to go and nothing to do but be with one another. I know for some this is not your definition of entertainment, but forgive me, I grew up in the time before computers, instant messaging, cell phones, etc. I still like sitting down with you and hearing what you have to say. I want to hear your stories. This community provides me with storytelling opportunities. Where else in life do we get to share our stories? And I'm talking about the personal storytelling that Jack Maguire (and Kathy Hislip) believes "invests our lives with more meaning; that connects us more vitally with others; that helps us develop our creativity; that strengthens our sense of humor; that increases our courage and confidence; and renders our lives more memorable." That's a tall order, but I agree with Jimmy Neil Smith, who writes: "We're all storytellers. We all live in a network of stories. There isn't a stronger connection between people than storytelling." Now all we have to do is carve out enough time to sit and pretend we've no place to go and nothing to do but be with one another and share our stories.

## GREEN CORNER

Non-toxic Spring Cleaning: Clean with a Clean Conscience!

Toxic chemicals are found in many conventional household cleaning products. They pollute our indoor air and can provoke asthmatic and allergic reactions.

Most conventional dish detergents, laundry detergents and stain removers are made from petroleum, a nonrenewable resource. Fragrances used in them may cause irritation and trigger allergic reactions. Some detergents contain alkylphenol ethoxylates (APEs), suspected hormone disrupters. Antibacterial soaps and cleansers promote growth of resistant bacteria.

Chlorine bleach is highly caustic and may cause skin irritation. In the environment, chlorine bleach can create organochlorines, which are suspected carcinogens as well as reproductive, neurological or immune-system toxins.

Conventional drain, toilet and oven cleaners may cause severe eye, skin and respiratory irritation. Air fresheners may trigger asthmatic or allergic reactions.

Household pesticides may harm the nervous and hormonal systems. They may trigger respiratory problems and cause serious eye and skin irritation and, possibly, cancer.

There are alternatives to toxic household products which are safer for us humans while being kinder to our environment. A list of safer, greener cleaning products is available on the Green Sanctuary table in the Fellowship Hall.
